Juan Carlos Ocon Director/Principal Competency A: Champions teacher and staff excellence through a focus on continuous improvement to develop and achieve the vision of high expectations for all students.

- It is a CIWP year. Our goal is to begin the CIWP meetings in the first week of October and will report out during the October meeting.
- The 5 day teacher institute day agenda is attached for your review. BJCA Aim: We collaborate to create
  equitable, individualized, and meaningful learning experiences for ALL students leading to readiness for
  college, careers, and civic life.
- Our SY19-20 Professional Learning Plan is attached. In collaboration with the IST, the Senior Leadership
  Team (SLT) has articulated a professional learning plan that is designed to keep teachers' focus where it
  is needed most, on instruction. The following plan includes a theory of action, professional learning
  goals for the year, and specific guidelines that will help us achieve our goals. The theory of action below
  draws on the CBL look-for document and reflects practices that are both foundational to CBL as well as
  powerful levers for deeper learning.
- The BJCA learning cycle is also attached. The cycle details how students will ensure that the PLP is implemented.
- The SY19-20 CBL Assessment Approach: Each subject group has four competencies. Each competency
  encompasses several performance indicators (strands). Student achievement on performance indicators
  (strands) is divided into eight achievement levels (numerical values) that appear in bands, and each
  band contains general, qualitative value statements called level descriptors. The level descriptors for
  each band describe a range of student performance in all performance indicators of a competency.
- CBL explained to students: The power point that explains CBL to students and the new assessment approach is attached.

Competency B: Creates powerful professional learning systems to guarantee learning for all students

- Enrichment: Our first Enrichment took place last week Wednesday and I want to extend my congratulations and express my gratitude to the entire staff. Our students moved quickly and with purpose throughout the campus. The hall monitors worked with the security team and with the staff and it was awesome. It was reported that 6 minutes in to the period, the halls were clear and students in Enrichment activities. Thank you to all! If you have questions about Enrichment, please reach out to Ms. Mendez/Ms. Dixon. Enrichment guidelines are attached.
- Advisory: The hall way monitor system was so successful that we are going to try to do the same
  with Advisory. Teachers have been reporting that students are arriving very late to advisory. To
  assist the security team, hall monitors will also help and ensure that student move with purpose
  through the campus. Developmental competencies are attached.
- Attendance: After 2 weeks of school, our attendance rate stands at 91.7%. We believe, however, that it should be higher as we have identified some district wide discrepancies that have lowered our attendance rate. On 3 different days, ASPEN was coding students incorrectly throughout the district. If these are corrected, our attendance will be at 94%. Please continue to diligently take attendance on a daily basis. If you have any questions or concerns, please see Mr. Colon or Ms. Villegas in room 137.
- Enrollment: The code 99 process is now complete and our enrollment stands at 1731. Monday, September 16, is also the 10<sup>th</sup> day of school.
- Cell Phone Policy: While the Cell Phone policy implementation has now started, we know that there are still issues. We will continue to socialize it among the students and parents. In the meantime, we ask that our school-wide messaging to students is consistent and follows the policy. If we all adhere to the policy early on, then we will be able to be more flexible later on.
- Lunch Forms: Lunch form completion is at 87.2%. We need your assistance to get to 100%. On Friday, students with missing forms were given a form to take home. They are to return the

completed form to the main office or to room 137. Because lunch form completion impacts budget, we are asking that you make it a point to speak to your students about it and remind them to drop-off the forms in the main office or room 137.

- College Gear Tuesdays: Post-Secondary Tuesdays! This is your chance to show off your military, trade, college, corps, employment, or gap program gear. Let's all come together to show our students that there is a post-secondary path for everyone! The more staff that participate, the stronger the message will be!
- Post-Secondary: Post-secondary work at Juarez has shifted to reflect CPS's initiative, Learn.Plan.Succeed., an effort to include additional post-secondary pathways for students. Therefore, recognizing that all students may not end up going to college, but may be considering military, trade, work, or gap year programs. Most of our work will include, but not limited to:
  - Collaborate with Senior Seminar teachers to create lesson plans around identity, self-efficacy, and post-secondary exploration.
  - Invite representatives from various post-secondary institutions and/or programs as part of student Enrichment opportunities
  - Host college and scholarship applications completion workshops during student lunch periods and/or after-school.
  - Work closely with outside partners such as Chicago Scholars, Northwestern Academy and Bottom Line, to support students outside school hours.
  - Visit college campuses, targeting students who are "eligible" to apply, and work with campus resources to reflect the experience of first-generation, low-income, Latinx students.
  - Host a "college" fair that includes various post-secondary pathways.
- Post-Secondary Success Team: This year, Juarez has established a professional team
  who aims to improve the systems and structures that support in fulfilling their postsecondary aspirations. The team is made up of counselors, senior seminar teachers,
  college coach, administration, and college and career coach. The team is lead by Ms.
  Olvera, the college and career coach.

The team's two collaborative goals are around "match" and "fit." "Match" Goal: By the end of Q2 (Semester 1), 100% of students in the class of 2020 will complete a minimum of 2+ college match applications in relevance to their selectivity level. Therefore, push to increase our college match rate from 6% in SY2016 to 10% in SY2020.

"FIT" GOAL: By the end of the school year, 100% of our students will have a final post-secondary pathway that meets the social and financial fit of the student.

Over the summer, the post-secondary success team met to review historical Juarez post-secondary data, read excerpts of "From High School to the Future: Potholes on the Road to College," to drive our conversation around creating goals and establishing a consistent post-secondary message for students and staff.

In addition, the post-secondary success team presented to all staff members during the summer professional development to introduce the team, goals, and efforts over the summer. Staff members reflected on their personal postsecondary stories and student scenarios, and review Juarez post-secondary data.

High School Fairs: Attached is the list of high school fairs Juarez counselors will be participating
in to begin recruiting for next year.

• A la Esperanza Mural: Mothers, students and community organizers fought to establish Benito Juárez High School in 1977 as a result of the walk-outs at Harrison and Froebel schools. The 1979 mural *A la esperanza* (to Hope) designed and painted at Benito Juárez High School came out of that struggle and still exists 40 years later. Designed by Malú Ortega and Jimmy Longoria, assisted by artists Salvador Vega, Marcos Raya, and Oscar Moya, *A la esperanza* was a project by Casa Aztlán and selected by the community to be painted outside of Benito Juárez in the summer of 1979.

In collaboration with the National Museum of Mexican Art, we are excited to invite you to the 40th anniversary celebration of the *A la esperanza* mural outside of Benito Juarez Community Academy's Athletic Center on Laflin and 21st St, right by the cul de sac. The ceremony will take place on Monday, September 16 at 2:30. Below is a link with information about the exhibit and celebration.

To make the celebration even more special, our Culinary students will cater the event and our drumline and Mariachi students will open the event. The celebration will continue at the National Museum of Mexican Art Monday evening, 9/16, from 6 to 8 P.M. At the museum, the full history of the mural will be on exhibition including the work of students Bibiana Saucedo and Carolina Quezada who chronicled the history of the mural in a comic book that will also be in exhibition.

• Soccer Program: The Juarez boys soccer program is up and running, and stronger than ever! For the first time, they were invited to the Windy City Ram Classic tournament hosted by Reavis High School and sponsored by the Chicago Fire. Like the City playoffs last year, Juarez was the "Cinderella Story" of the tournament. This time, we made it all the way to the final game and played in the Championship ON The Chicago Fire field at SeatGeek stadium. While we dropped a tough 2 - 1 battle to suburban powerhouse Lockport, we earned a reputation as described in the beautiful article about the game (<a href="https://www.chicagolandsoccer.org/gs--lockport-vs-juarez-9-5-19.html">https://www.chicagolandsoccer.org/gs--lockport-vs-juarez-9-5-19.html</a>).

We played conference game in between tournament games and still managed a tie with Washington, a loss to Curie, and ended with a win over Uno Soccer during that 2 weeks. This week was all conference action during the week and ended with the prestigious PepsiCo tournament. We dropped a heartbreaker to Hancock, but then rebounded 2 days later to hand Kelly a 2 - 0 loss on their home field. When the state ranking came out on Fri, Juarez was still ranked 38th in the state and 19th in class 3A (<a href="https://www.maxpreps.com/high-schools/juarez-eagles-(chicago,il)/soccer/rankings.htm">https://www.maxpreps.com/high-schools/juarez-eagles-(chicago,il)/soccer/rankings.htm</a>)!!!!

This week is PepsiCo action. We host local powerhouse Cicero-Morton high school on Tuesday at 5, and then travel to Morton for a different PepsiCo opponent on Thursday.

The JV team is undefeated in conference play, with wins over Hancock and Kelly. They have won 3 and tied 2 games.

The Sophomore - Freshmen team opened their season with a 3 - 0 win over Kelly.

All three teams are ready to make a deep run at the city championship at all three levels.

We thanks the students, staff, and families of Juarez for all their support so far. Mon.Sept. 23 we host current City Champs, Solorio and we want to fill the stands with our fans. Please come out and support us on that day at 4:30 if at all possible.

 Football Program: This past Saturday junior Edward Garza started as quarterback for the first time. With some extremely accurate passes the Eagles scored three touchdowns. However, this proved to be not enough with a loss to DRW charter school. This loss does bring our record to 0-3.

Restorative Practices Initiative: Allyson is our Restorative Practices Coach. Allyson has a
background in social work. This allows her to understand the obstacles our students face.
She will be present in the building on the first day and throughout the first week.

The goal of the partnership is to support Juarez staff in building up restorative practices in the classroom and school-wide. Through the partnership, we will provide a space for the staff to learn, practice and refine skills around:

- Integrating Restorative Practices into the classroom
- Learning strategies for behavior issues
- Deescalating conflicts
- Facilitating restorative conversations
- Facilitating talking circles
